

- You might think that the choice for America's national bird was an easy one, but that wasn't exactly the case. After the Declaration of Independence was signed, the American colonists were not only fighting for their freedom, but a national identity as well. An American Flag was created as a way of uniting the people fighting for independence as well as symbolizing the 13 colonies. Now, Congress had to choose the right bird.
- The bald eagle seemed the perfect choice for many members of Congress. For one thing, the bird is only found in North America. This made it unique as opposed to other eagles found throughout the world. It has a beautifully broad wingspan of seven feet. The Bald Eagle soars high in the air, and is strong and independent. These were some of the attributes that Congress hoped would represent the people of the new country. In addition, the bald eagle can live up to 30 years which is a very long life for a bird. America's founders were hoping the new country they were creating would also have longevity.

One American Founding Father in particular, believed that there was a better choice for our country's national bird. Ben Franklin argued that the wild turkey was a more sensible option. He considered the wild turkey to be a "bird of courage" as opposed to the bald eagle which took away food from other birds. Franklin was in the minority however (actually, there is no official documentation of Ben Franklin arguing with Congress in favor of using a turkey instead of the Bald Eagle; although he did write a letter to his

daughter two years after the Seal's official approval, voicing his

concerns regarding the "bad moral character" of the Bald Eagle).

In 1782, Congress decided on a design for the Great Seal of the United States of America. The bald eagle is proudly displayed right in the middle. Congress must have been pleased with their choice, because The bald eagle is also on various forms of American currency, stamps, and patriotic decorations. Almost two centuries later bald eagles had become an endangered species, due to over hunting and pollution. Fearing that they might become extinct, Congress enacted laws in an effort to protect this important and beloved symbol of America.
